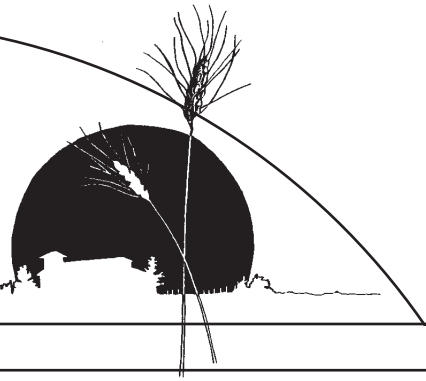


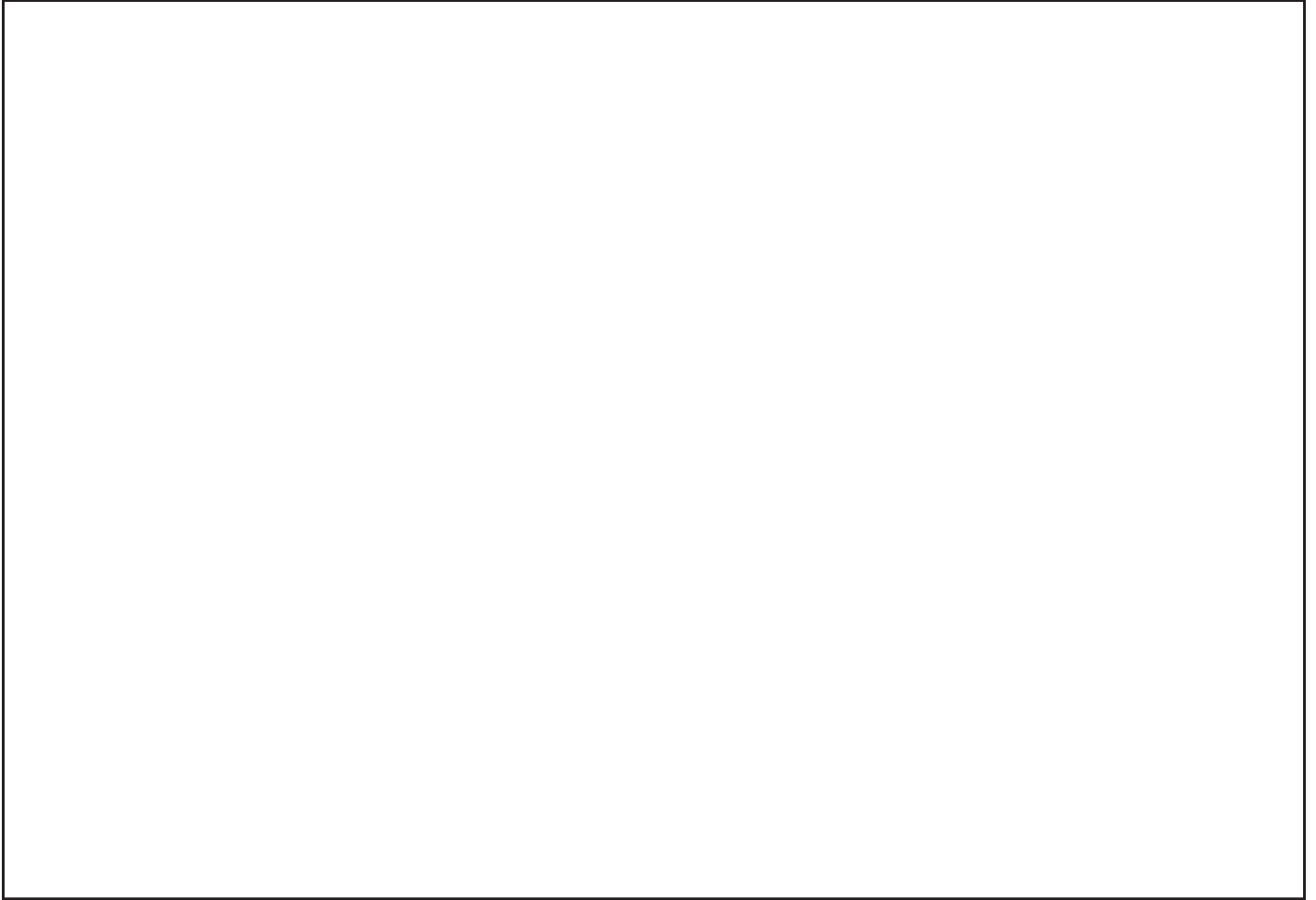

The Oratory, Grailville's chapel, was designed by Bill as he converted a "barn" into a sacred space for Grailville's residents and guests.

After the reception, Grailville will host a good old-fashioned Grailville buffet dinner, beginning at 5:30 p.m.

Important Questions Spur Us On

Something about Grailville seems to generate questions. Tucked into the quilted hills of southwest Ohio, "peaceful" tends to be the first impression of motorists working their way along Route 48. Peaceful it is most often. Still we take seriously our task of comforting the afflicted and afflicting the comfortable.

Sometimes questions are asked about the Grail. When members of the Grail define the Grail we often start with the Spirit—the Spirit that calls us, inspires us, the Spirit within the Grail to which we can say "Amen." If we start with the Spirit, we also hope to end with Spirit as the base on which we stand, the firm ground in which we are planting our hopes for a better world. Together with Grail members throughout the U.S.A. and the world, Grailville is working toward transforming our world into a place of justice, peace, and love. Starting with ourselves.

Most often we are the ones asking questions. The questions about hunger in the world and in our own rich country and the many decisions that are made related to the condition of hunger cannot let us rest. Our elected officials respond respectfully to our

letters about disastrous budget choices, saying they are glad to hear of our interest in this topic and look forward to hearing from us again. Because the Grail is an international movement, we often know the people suffering from our government's unfortunate policies; we see the effect of NAFTA (North American Free Trade Agreement) on our country's neighbors. Together with our neighbors in this hemisphere, in Europe, and in Africa we demonstrate, we pray, and we work for peace. Here in the U.S.A., many Grail members live in States that have not yet abolished the death penalty. All of these situations and conditions raise tough questions.

Much of the work that we do does not make money for us and is not readily fundable, causing our own stressful financial needs. Sometimes people say, "If you need money, why don't you sell the place? Developers would pay good prices to have such a space!" This raises another important question for us. But, we have learned from Native Americans that we do not OWN land. Our Mother, the Earth, lets us plant organic vegetables, dig new water systems, carve out a labyrinth. Our life on this land is purely a gift for which we are grateful.

Lydwine Van Kersbergen Endowment Fund for Grailville

In this issue of our newsletter you will find a brochure asking you to help Grailville by giving a financial contribution towards the establishment of a one million dollar endowment fund.

The endowment campaign was started in January 2001 through the initiative of Shrikant Dighe of Bethesda, Maryland, to support Grailville with a permanent source of income. Other members of the Grailville Development Committee, created and headed by Audrey Sorrento, further developed the project. Carla Stewart of Loveland, Ohio, also a member of the committee, produced the brochure you are receiving with this newsletter. The fund was named after one of the founders of Grailville, Lydwine Van Kersbergen.

In the last three years, thanks to the generosity of many good friends, the endowment has grown to \$305,537.33! This amount represents about 30% of our goal. It is a good start, but still not enough to provide Grailville with a cash flow that will significantly help cover some of our ever-increasing operating expenses.

News in Brief

Grailville, as an environmental center modeling living sustainably, and as an educational center founded on 'observing and absorbing,' has some exciting projects in the works.

The **Wastewater Environmental Treatment (WET) Project** has received a one-year, \$30,000 grant from the Greater Cincinnati Foundation to fund the position of Education Coordinator. The Coordinator will design and implement programs for adult and youth groups, collaborate with local schools and colleges, educate government officials and land developers, and train a cadre of volunteers as workshop leaders. All of these efforts support Grailville's development of a wastewater system that is ecologically sound, functional, sustainable, and efficient.

The **Garden Internship Program**, where women 'learn-by-working' in Grailville's organic gardens is a three
